My name is Dorothy Farbo. I am 69 yrs. old sentenced to LWOP. I am presently housed at SCI - Cambridge Springs, a minimum Security prison with 26 yrs. in on this sentence.

The woman I am today ventures far from the trauma/TCU nurse I once was. None of my degrees could prepare me for the sadness, isolation and remorse I feel everyday. The sadness I brought to both families.

I could've walked out of the house, called police or family but, in an instant of desperation, I fought back & in that instant I took my husband's life. That choice will be in my heart, mind & soul forever.

Even now, writing to you, I feel guilty asking you to help. How can I ask for my life back when my victim's life is gone?

I pray one day the family can forgive me. I'm so sorry for the pain I caused. I am responsible for that pain. I try to forgive myself - some days I'm successful.

I stay positive, pray so I don't go crazy, help as many people as I can. Nothing can make up for what I did - but allow me to move forward. I want to be that good neighbor, employee, a positive force in my community.

I'm healthy w/ a strong mind. I want to

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contribute, support myself. Allow me to
make up for what I did & move forward.

Please help - consider HB 135 / SB 942
for possible parole for life sentenced
individuals. I want to lead a productive,
positive life.
